- Park County Emergency Services has created a Flood Recovery Financial Assistance Packet with local, state and federal financial resources for Park County residents who have been affected by flooding. - FEMA Individual Assistance has been approved for Park County. Ways to apply:

 - Call 800-621-3362 (800-462-7585 TTY). Open every day from 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. MST.
 - Download the FEMA App for smartphones or mobile devices
- In the coming weeks FEMA will be setting up Disaster Recovery Centers in Park County to help residents apply for assistance.
- Small Business Administration low-interest federal disaster loans are now available for Park
 County businesses. Information about how to apply is available online at www.SBA.gov/disaster.
 You may also call 800-659-2955.
- Yellowstone National Park Information:
 - The northern part of the Park is open to foot traffic via the North (Gardiner) and Northeast (Cooke City/Silver Gate) entrances except for specific closures. Check www.nps.gov/vell for more information.
 - The Northern Loop is open out to Tower Junction (including Dunraven Pass).
 - A 23 mile segment of the Beartooth Highway from Cooke City to the Beartooth Ski Hill Area has been reopened (from US-212/WY-296).
 - The Alternate License Plate System to enter the Park has been suspended.

- Park County Road crews will be working on Cinnabar Basin Rd until Friday, 7/08 from 7AM 4PM.
 The road is open to traffic with flaggers.
- Some residences in Silver Gate continue having issues with Centurylink landline service. The issue is being worked on.

Water Update

There are no boil advisories in effect for any water district in Park County. If you are on a private well and have questions about water safety or testing, please call the Park County Health Department 406-222-4145.

Southwest Montana Flood Relief Fund:
